

J. Russell George
Inspector General

Following his nomination by President George W. Bush and confirmation by the Senate, J. Russell George was sworn in as the Inspector General of the Corporation for National and Community Service by the former Majority Leader of the United States Senate, Senator Bob Dole on September 4, 2002.

From 1995 until assuming his position, Mr. George served as staff director and chief counsel of the United States House of Representatives Committee on Government Reform's Subcommittee on Government Efficiency, Financial Management and Intergovernmental Relations. Mr. George practiced law at the New York law firm of Kramer, Levin, Naftalis, Nessen, Kamin & Frankel from 1993 until joining the staff of the Committee on Government Reform. He served as associate director for policy in the White House Office of National Service from 1991 until 1993 and was assistant general counsel at the Office of Management and Budget from 1990 until 1991. Prior to joining the White House staff, Mr. George served as a prosecutor in the Queens County New York District Attorney's Office.

Mr. George received his Bachelor of Arts degree, Phi Beta Kappa, *magna cum laude*, in 1985 from Howard University and received his Doctorate of Jurisprudence from Harvard University's School of Law in 1988.
